Subject: The Viral Hepatitis Prevention Board endorses the World Hepatitis Day on 19 May 2008.

To whom it may concern,

On behalf the Viral Hepatitis Prevention Board I'm pleased to inform you that we fully support the World Hepatitis Day 2008.

The major objective of the Viral Hepatitis Prevention Board (VHPB), established in 1992, is to contribute to the control and prevention of viral hepatitis, by drawing the attention to this important public health problem, by issuing prevention guidelines, and by encouraging actions to improve control and prevention. VHPB focus audiences are, in the first instance, policymakers, opinion leaders, and health care professionals in Europe.

There is a clear lack of attention towards prevention and control of viral hepatitis. Major gaps exist towards surveillance of acute cases and data on chronic viral hepatitis is almost non-existing. Although on the level of primary prevention of hepatitis B infection significant achievements can be reported, in 2006 154 of 193 WHO member states had introduced universal vaccination, a lot still needs to be done. The benefit of vaccination against hepatitis B is sometimes perceived as limited, leading to rejection of vaccination. Awareness of the real disease menace is crucial and the value of protection against infection needs continuous promotion. Young chronic hepatitis B patients are testimonies of the breaches in the current prevention programmes.

Taken into account the importance and relevance of this initiative the Viral Hepatitis Prevention Board firmly endorses the World Hepatitis Day 2008. We hope that this patient driven initiative will have a major global impact on the general awareness of Viral Hepatitis, and will increase the political commitment to prevent and control viral hepatitis infection and its consequences.
